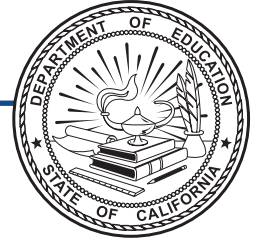

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Directions for Administration

Who Takes the Alternate ELPAC?

The Alternate ELPAC is for students with the most significant disabilities whose individualized education program (IEP) team has designated the use of an alternate assessment and who also have been identified as English learners (ELs) or potential ELs.

Introduction to the Alternate ELPAC Training Test *Directions for Administration (DFA)*

This manual contains the directions and specific scripts you will need to administer Training Tests for the Alternate ELPAC. There is an Alternate ELPAC Training Test available for kindergarten through grade five and grades six through twelve. Each Training Test contains fewer test questions than the operational Alternate ELPAC but has all the item types (e.g., multiple choice or constructed response) included on the operational assessment. (Therefore, the Training Test does not produce scores.) The Training Test is available all year and may be used at any time in preparation for the Alternate ELPAC. This *DFA* must be used to administer a Training Test.

The purposes of the Alternate ELPAC Training Tests are to:

- familiarize students and test examiners* with the item types.
- provide a sample of the test questions and grade-level content that appear on the Alternate ELPAC.
- allow students and test examiners to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online test.
- allow test examiners to try out accessibility resources (e.g., zoom in and out).

Training Tests can be administered in one of two ways, either

- using a standard supported web browser to access the Training Test directly, without use of the Test Administrator Interface or secure browser, by using a guest session; or
- using the same procedures as the operational tests, with the Test Administrator Interface, secure browser, and individual student logon information.

A parent or a guardian can access the Training Test through a guest session and act in the test examiner role during testing. A test examiner or a school staff member would access the Training Test through the appropriate role in TOMS or through a guest session.

*A test examiner does not need to be present to use the Alternate ELPAC Training Test; however, the term “test examiner” is used in this document to show what a test examiner would do to administer the test.

Overview of the Alternate ELPAC

The Alternate ELPAC measures the four domains of Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing in an integrated manner; that is, a single task type assesses multiple domains. (The term “task type” refers to a story and its related test questions. There are two task types in the Training Test.) To ensure ELs with the most significant cognitive disabilities can fully access and participate in the Alternate ELPAC, students may use their individually preferred communication modes. This allows maximum flexibility for students to demonstrate their English proficiency using the ways they communicate in the classroom and in everyday contexts.

A student with the most significant cognitive disabilities may communicate using the following methods.

- Verbal communication in one-, two-, or multiple-word phrases and sentences (A student may communicate using several forms of communication to indicate communicative intent.)
- Sign language, eye gaze, pointing, gestures, augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) devices, or other alternative communication modes to comprehend and express information
- Writing to communicate (A student may make marks and use other communication modes to clarify the writing. A student may draw or write one-, two-, or multiple-word phrases and sentences using a variety of spelling and grammatical forms to communicate.)
 - ◆ Students should have access to the tools they use for writing in the classroom during the test. For example, students may use pencil and paper, a keyboard, their AAC device, alternate pencils, or a scribe. This list of response options is not exhaustive.
- Several modes of communication to indicate communicative intent

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Overview of the Task Types and Item Types





The Alternate ELPAC Training Test is designed to present each item type available on the Alternate ELPAC to allow students and test examiners to become familiar with each item type. The Training Test contains six item types. These item types are presented as:

Communicate About Familiar Topics	The student is presented with a brief story of one to three sentences about a familiar topic. A photo is included for context and support. Directions for Administration (cont.)

Using the *DFA*

This *DFA* contains the script for administration of the Alternate ELPAC Training Test. Keyword instructions and symbols for test examiners are as follows:

Guide to Administration Scripts	How the Test Examiner Should Proceed
SAY	The test examiner reads the material aloud to the student.
POINT TO the corresponding picture.	The test examiner points to the information on the screen.
READ the question and each option aloud. POINT TO each option as you read it.	The test examiner reads the question and each option on the screen aloud while pointing to the graphics or text on the screen.
GIVE the object(s) to the student.	The test examiner gives the object or objects to the student.
SCORE the response.	The test examiner scores the student's response following the rubric provided in the <i>DFA</i> .
	Information for the test examiner.
	Indicates a receptive test question.
	Indicates an expressive test question.
	Indicates a test question with a modeling rubric.
IND	The test examiner administers the item using real objects and/or picture cards, as specified in the <i>DFA</i> , to students who typically use these during classroom instruction.
ALT	The test examiner reads the alternative text instead of pointing to the image.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Alternate Ways to Provide Directions

Some students may need directions provided in alternate ways. For example:

- Test examiners of students who are deaf or hard of hearing may use sign language where **SAY** directions appear.
- Test examiners of students with visual impairments may provide alternative text where **POINT TO** directions appear. (Refer to the Alternative Text for Students with Visual Impairments section for additional details.)
- Test examiners of students who point to pictures as their response mode may substitute "Point to" or "Touch" for "Show me" directions.
- Test examiners of students who use objects that can be held or touched may substitute "Point to," "Show me," "Give me," "Touch," or other directives, as appropriate and as used with the student in daily instruction and communication.

Test examiners should use their knowledge of the student, their student's communication modes and disability-related needs, and their best professional judgment to ensure directions are accessible to the student.

Alternative Text for Students with Visual Impairments **ALT**

Within the *DFA* are icons to indicate alternative text for students with visual impairments. The alternative text describes images.

The alternative text directives are used only as a supplement to the administration script and should not be used in place of the administration script.

Where the administration script prompts a test examiner to "**POINT TO**" an image, the test examiner would instead read the alternative text to the student.

- For items that include multiple images within a story or passage, the test examiner would read the alternative text in place of pointing to the related image, in the order in which the image appears in the story or passage.
- The alternative text can be repeated based on a student's need or request.
- The alternative text should be read exactly as it is written in the *DFA*.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Optional Individualization **IND**

All test questions may be individualized based upon the student's IEP and following the ELPAC Accessibility Resources for Operational Testing web document—<https://www.elpac.org/test-administration/accessibility-resources/>. This *DFA* provides test examiners with guidelines on how to individualize test questions.

The Alternate ELPAC should be administered to each student in a consistent manner according to the directions provided, with variations only as specified in each student's IEP. However, to maximize engagement for all students, the Alternate ELPAC may offer additional options for individualization in specific test questions.

Optional individualization is the ability for test examiners to provide objects (either real objects or models of objects, such as plastic coins) and picture cards, as appropriate for an individual student, to help ensure the student can fully interact with the test.

This *DFA* specifies additional individualization options. As you prepare to administer the Alternate ELPAC to a student, decide if individualization is appropriate. If so, gather the alternative materials before you start testing with the student. A summary of the materials that may be needed for this Training Test can be found in [appendix A](#).

Optional individualization provides for the use of real objects or manipulatives.

Test examiners should make sure the student is engaged with the manipulatives or objects and not the testing screen.

Preparation for Test Administration for Students Using Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) Devices

For students with communication needs requiring advance preparation of supplemental testing materials, such as an AAC device, the test examiner:

- is permitted to preview test content before testing with the student; and
- should program the AAC device with general topics (e.g., parts of the body; emotions; articles of clothing; common animals, classroom objects, foods, and home and school activities).

Test examiners should be teachers who are the most familiar with the individual needs of the students who uses an AAC device. (A parent or guardian may administer the Training Test to the student as well.)

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Administering the Test

Before Testing

1. Read this entire *DFA*. Make any notes in the *DFA* that may help you during testing.
2. Determine what resources—universal tools, designated supports, or accommodations—the student may need. (Refer to the ELPAC Accessibility Resources for Operational Testing document for allowable testing resources, available at <https://www.elpac.org/test-administration/accessibility-resources/>; note that only the test directions may be translated into the student’s primary language. Parents/Guardians, if you have questions regarding these resources, contact your child’s teacher.)
 - ◆ Be sure to gather any supplemental testing materials needed by the individual student, such as paper, writing tools, picture cards, or an AAC device. (Note: If paper is used, it must be securely destroyed as soon as the administration is complete.)
 - ◆ Be sure to program the student’s AAC device prior to starting the test session, if the use of such a device is the student’s communication mode, as needed for the administration.
3. Verify the grade level assigned to the student and that you have the correct *DFA* for that grade span.
4. Establish a quiet testing environment and limit the chance of distractions.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Student Engagement and Test Completion

Establishing and maintaining student engagement is important to the successful administration of the Alternate ELPAC. Test examiners should:

- provide the student with as much time as needed.
- allow the student to communicate as the student does every day.
- give the Training Test multiple times to provide practice to the student.
- pause and resume the Training Test as needed to allow the student to perform well.
- end the test when the student is not engaged or is showing signs of behavioral or sensory concerns, even after a break has been provided.

Student Responses

The Alternate ELPAC is designed for one-on-one administration. Students may respond:

- by independently navigating and selecting responses directly in the testing device when able.
- by indicating a response verbally or through any of the student's alternate response modes, such as gestures, eye gaze, or an AAC device, and the test examiner selects the response for the student in the testing platform.

For some test questions scored with a rubric, modeling of the correct answer is allowed as described in the rubric. **Hand-over-hand or other physical prompting should *not* be used.**


Scoring of Student Responses

- Each multiple-choice test question is worth one point.
- Test questions with a rubric have three possible scores.
 - ◆ Students receive two points for score A, a correct response.
 - ◆ Students receive one point for score B, a correct response after modeling.
 - ◆ Students receive zero points for score C, an incorrect response.

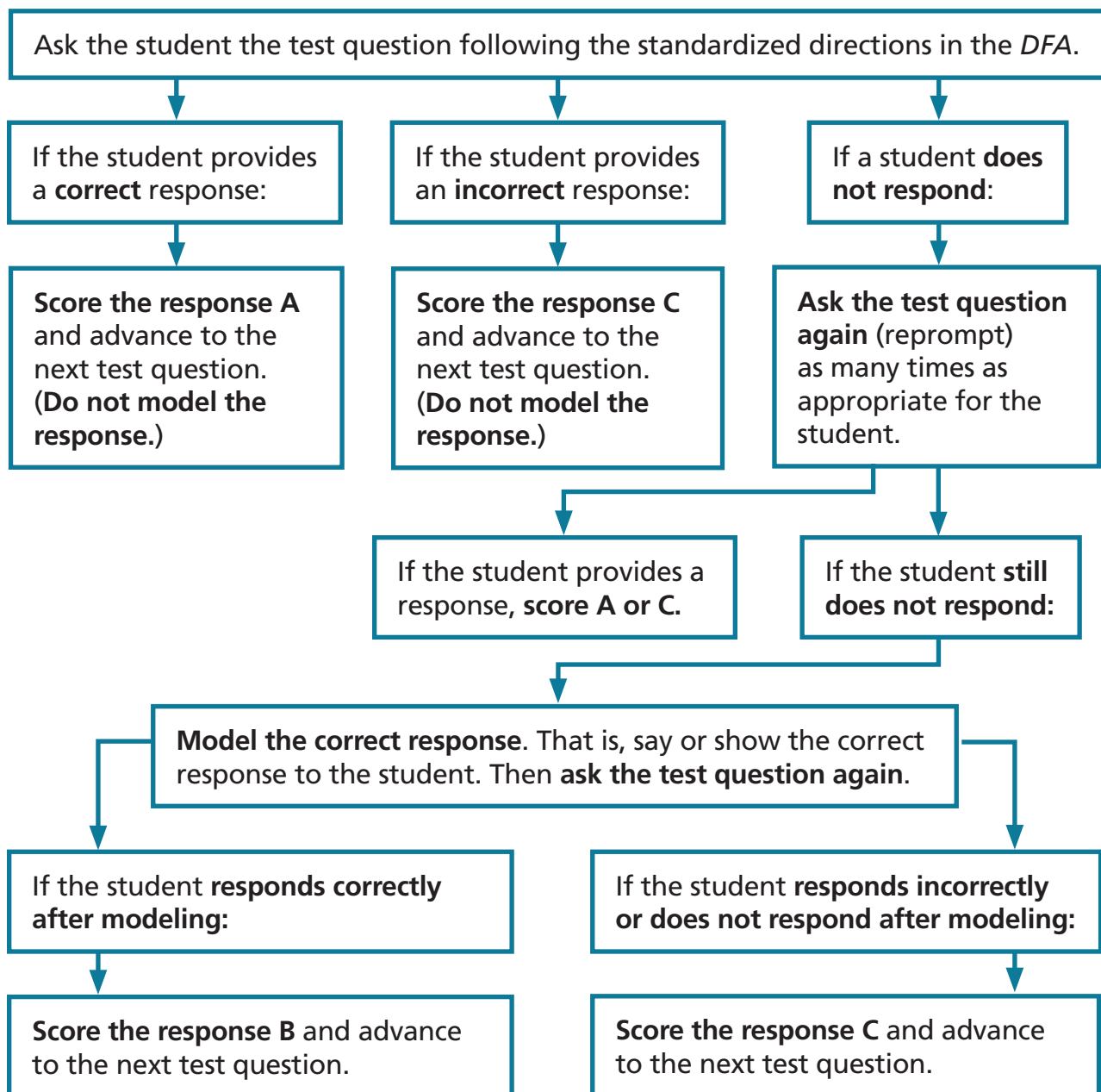
The scoring rubrics in the *DFA* provide samples of correct and partially correct responses in addition to scoring information. These sample responses are examples of how a student could respond to the test question.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Test Questions that Allow Modeling

The task type *Communicate About Familiar Topics* includes a test question with a rubric that allows for modeling . To model a response, say or show (that is, point to or otherwise indicate), as appropriate for the student, the correct response. The following flowchart provides directions for modeling. For examples of a modeled response, refer to page 10.

Modeling Rubric Flowchart



Directions for Administration (cont.)

Examples of Modeled Responses

What is this?



Select score below.

Example 1 – Verbal Response

Test examiner: (points to picture on screen) What is this?

Student: (No response)

Test examiner: (points to picture on screen) What is this? Tell me.

Student: (No response)

Test examiner: (points to picture on screen) What is this? [pause] *A sock.* [pause] What is this?

Student: Sock.

In this example, the student verbally responds with the correct answer after the test examiner provides (**models**) the correct response. The test examiner would then score the response B following the rubric provided with the test question in the *DFA* and advance to the next test question. The student receives partial credit (one point).

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Is this a cup?

Example 2 – Picture Card Response

Test examiner: (gives cup to student) Is this a cup?

Test examiner: (points to yes/no cards used in daily instruction) Yes or no.

Student: (No response)

Test examiner: (points to cup held by student) Is this a cup?

Test examiner: (points again to yes/no cards) Yes or no.

Student: (No response)

Test examiner: (points to cup held by student) Is this a cup? [pause]

Test examiner: (points to yes card) Yes, *this is a cup*. [pause]

Test examiner: (points to cup held by student) Is this a cup?

Student: (No response)

This particular student's expressive communication mode is picture cards. The test examiner gives the cup to the student and presents the *yes and no* picture cards used in daily instruction. The student does not respond, even after the test examiner provides (**models**) the correct response. The test examiner would then score the response C following the rubric provided with the test question in the *DFA* and advance to the next test question. The student receives no points.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

Presentation Guidelines

Some prompting on the Alternate ELPAC is allowed during test administration, as described in this section.

Repeating Test Content

For all task types, the test examiner may read aloud the directions, story or passage, parts of the story or passage, test question, and options as many times as the student needs.

Allowing for Wait Time

Provide enough wait time, as typical for that individual student in classroom contexts, before reprompting or moving on to the next question. Five to seven seconds of wait time is suggested; more may be necessary based on the individual needs of the student being tested.

Emphasizing Test Content

Use a neutral voice and a conversational tone throughout testing. Do not emphasize specific phrases or words, unless these are underlined in the test question.

Using the Student's Individually Preferred Communication Mode(s)

On the Alternate ELPAC, a student can respond to test items using the student's individually preferred communication mode(s). For example:

- On a multiple-choice question, the student can point, gesture, speak, or gaze to indicate a response.
- On questions with a rubric, the student can speak, write, use sign language, use picture cards, or access an AAC device to express a response. All students should be afforded an opportunity to provide a written response to test questions scored with a rubric.

Providing Positive Reinforcement

Test examiners may provide encouragement as needed for the student being tested. For example, neutral expressions, such as "Nice work," may encourage the student to stay focused and engaged.

Directions for Administration (cont.)

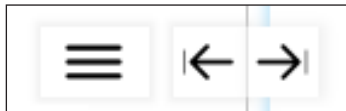
Presentation Guidelines for Specific Task Types

The presentation guidelines described on page 12 apply to all task types. Additional guidelines may apply to specific task types.

- For task types with a rubric that allows for [modeling](#): Model the correct response only after reprompting the student to respond. For more information on modeling, refer to the Test Questions that Allow Modeling section on page 9.
- Sentence-completion questions with open-ended responses (fill in the blank): Use visual cues or other cues familiar to the student to indicate the student should finish or complete the sentence.

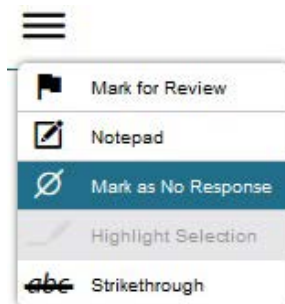
Using the Expand Tools

- It is recommended that a story or passage be expanded when you read it aloud to the student. Expand the story or passage to fit the entire screen by selecting the right arrow icon [→] from the expandable items tool at the top of the screen.
- It is recommended that each test question be expanded when you administer it to the student. Expand the test question to fit the entire screen by selecting the left arrow icon [←] from the expandable items tool at the top of the screen.



Selecting the “Mark as No Response” Option

For cases where the student is presented with a question and does not respond, after reprompting and attempts have been made to reengage the student, go to the Context Menu icon (≡) in the upper-right corner of a question pane and select **[Mark as No Response]**. The **[Mark as No Response]** option should be selected only after the student has been reprompted and attempts have been made to reengage the student. Once **[Mark as No Response]** has been selected, advance to the next test question if the student is engaged and ready to continue testing. If the student is no longer engaged, you may pause testing and resume when appropriate. When resuming testing, the test question(s) that were marked as no response can be presented to the student again by the test examiner as appropriate. Administration Scripts for Test Questions

Testing Reminders:

1. For test questions that allow for manipulatives, refer to [appendix A](#).
2. For test questions that include alternative text **ALT**, refer to [page 5](#).
3. For test questions that include **ALT** and **IND**, use the directions for students with visual impairments and students who would benefit from the use of objects.

Task Type: Communicate About Familiar Topics

Story

SAY: Let's read about a car.

READ the story aloud.

POINT TO the corresponding picture.

ALT *The picture shows a car.*

IND As you read the story, **GIVE** the manipulative of the car to the student.

i Refer to the student’s usual expressive mode of communication to prompt the student to begin. For example, if the student uses the computer or an AAC device to express a response, **SAY: Use the computer/your device** [or other wording familiar to the student].


IND For students who use a *yes and no* device or picture cards to express a *yes or no* response:
 After reading the question aloud,
SAY: Yes. No.
POINT TO the corresponding pictures on the device or picture cards.
 Present the *yes and no* device or picture cards used with the student in daily instruction.

SCORE the response.

- If the student responds correctly or indicates “yes,” select A.
- If the student provides an incorrect response, or a response not in English, select C.
- If the student does not respond, **READ** the question aloud again. (Repeat as appropriate. If the student responds, score A or C.)
-  If the student still does not respond, **READ** the question aloud again and **model the correct response**: say or show “yes.” Repeat the question.
 - ◆ If the student responds correctly after modeling, select B.
 - ◆ If the student does not respond, the response is not in English, or the response is incorrect, select C.

Appendix A: List of Additional Materials for Test Questions

This appendix contains a list of the materials that may be used in place of graphics for students with visual impairments that prevent the students from viewing the graphics, or for students who would benefit from the use of real objects or manipulatives. The materials must be gathered in advance of testing. These materials should be familiar to the student or objects typically used in the classroom.

Administering an Alternate ELPAC Training Test Session

Testing Checklist

- Confirm that all needed materials for administration including testing device, paper, pencil, AAC device, picture cards, and manipulatives or objects for optional individualization have been gathered.
- Confirm or apply the correct test settings for the student.
 - If you are an educator administering the Training Test using the same procedures as the operational tests**, confirm that the student has been assigned the correct test settings (designated supports and accommodations) in the Test Operations Management System (TOMS).
 - If you are an educator or parent administering the Training Test using a standard supported web browser without the use of the Test Administrator Interface or secure browser**, apply the appropriate test settings (designated supports and accommodations) for the student in the Student Testing Interface for the Training Tests directly.
- Verify you are using the correct test and grade span *DFA*.
- Administer the Training Test using the instructions in the [Administration Scripts for Test Questions](#) section of this *DFA*.
